

Dangling Modifiers

A dangling modifier is a word or phrase that modifies a word not clearly stated in the sentence. A modifier describes, clarifies, or gives more detail about a concept--it's a like a phrase that acts like an adjective or adverb.

For example:

Having finished the assignment, Jill turned on the TV.

This is a correct example of a modifier (meaning it is NOT dangling) because Jill is the person who has finished the assignment.

Having finished the assignment, the TV was turned on.

This is an incorrect example because the TV was not the thing that finished the assignment--we don't know who finished the assignment because the sentence doesn't tell us.
